> Phase I Archaeological Investigations: Lake Wissota Business Park, RE: Chippewa County, Wisconsin

Dear Mr. Stelzner,





Figure 1. Project Area and Previously Identified Archaeological and Cemetery/Burial Sites within One Mile

Chippewa County proposes to construct a mixed use business and technology business park in Township 29 North, Range 8 West, Sections 28 and 33, Chippewa County, Wisconsin (Figure 1). The business park will offer the regional work force access to major educational institutions, "shovel ready" sites, close proximity to Interstate 94, and incentive packages customized for quality prospects. The proposed construction of the business park is being submitted to the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) Ready, Set Build initiative, which aims to identify certified sites for business development in Wisconsin.

Phase I archaeological survey of the Area of Potential Effect (APE) was conducted by Commonwealth Cultural Resources Group, Inc. (CCRG) personnel from October 5-10, 2012. Archaeological survey of the project area was conducted under a Wisconsin Public Lands Field Archaeological Permit issued to CCRG by the Office of the State Archaeologist on September 26, 2012 (Attachment 1). Pre-field research revealed five previously reported archaeological sites and one cemetery/burial site to be present within one mile (mi) (1.6 kilometers [km]) of the proposed project area (Figure 1, Table 1). Based on the records provided by your office a portion of the project area was previously surveyed by the Great Lakes Archaeological Research Center (GLARC) (Attachment 2); however, the Wisconsin Historical Society Historic Preservation Database (WHPD) does not reference this area as previously surveyed.

The Area of Potential Effects (APE) was defined as encompassing the proposed industrial park and associated construction areas, an area of 109.6 acre (ac) (44.4 hectare [ha]) (Figure 2). Of this, 7.8 ac (3.2 ha) of the APE have been subject to previous archaeological survey (Penman 1993), 16.5 ac (6.7 ha) were visually verified as disturbed, 69.2 ac (28 ha) were subject to 15 m (49 ft) interval shovel testing, and 16.1 ac (6.5 ha) were subject to 5 m (16 ft) interval surface collection (Figure 2). Because the area surveyed by GLARC was not included in the WHPD, CCRG considered it unsurveyed and completed survey of this area in the current investigation (Figure 2).

The project area is bisected by an abandoned railroad track (Figure 2). The portion of the APE located on the south side of the railroad track displayed no surface visibility and was therefore shovel tested at a 15 meter (m) (49 foot [ft]) interval. Two large borrow pits are located in the southwestern and east-central portion of this area and were visually verified as disturbed (Figure 2). Additionally, shovel tests excavated within the central and eastern portion of this area also were found to be disturbed by previous earth moving activities, presumably associated with the borrow pits. Undisturbed soil profiles in this area were composed of an O horizon extending 5 centimeters below surface (cmbs) (2 inches below surface [inbs]), underlain by a 30 cm thick dark grayish brown (10YR 4/2) clay loam A horizon, underlain by a dark yellowish brown (10YR 4/4) B horizon.

The portion of the APE north of the railroad tracks is comprised of six agricultural fields and grass covered areas with no surface visibility. Four of the agricultural fields displayed surface visibilities of 20 percent or greater; therefore, these fields were subject to surface collection at a 5 m (16 ft) interval (Figure 2). The remaining two agricultural fields were fallow with little to no surface visibility and were shovel tested at a 15 m (49 ft) interval, as were the grass covered areas surrounding and in-between the agricultural fields. Additionally, a third borrow pit is situated in the southwestern portion of the APE north of the railroad tracks. It was visually verified as disturbed (Figure 2).

As was the case with the APE located south of the railroad tracks, both disturbed and undisturbed soil profiles were observed throughout the APE north of the tracks. The undisturbed soil profiles in the northern area displayed matching profiles to those in the south. Additionally, a

small scatter of historic whiteware and earthenware sherds and square cut nails were noted within the southwestern portion of the APE north of the railroad tracks; however, these artifacts were identified in a secondary context and are not considered to constitute an archaeological site.

No archaeological features or materials were identified during the course of the October 2012 investigation. Therefore, it is CCRG's opinion that the proposed undertaking will have no effect on National Register of Historic Places eligible archaeological resources and no additional archaeological investigations of the proposed Lake Wissota Business Park as currently designed is recommended.


